A primer to the pence issues of Newfoundland

f the five provinces of Canada that had their own stamps, Newfoundland, in 1857, was the second to last to issue stamps. Canada, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia issued stamps in 1851, while British Columbia waited until 1860.

Like its counterparts, Newfoundland's first stamps were denominated in pence and shillings, but unlike Canada, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, it did not adopt the decimal system in 1859. It waited, along with British Columbia, until 1865 before converting to it.

As the Newfoundland pence issue is a complicated one, this article will provide an introduction and general information about the

issue, and will not study each value in depth.

Figure 1 shows Newfoundland Scott 1-9, representing the nine basic designs of Newfoundland's pence issue.

The complexity of Newfoundland's pence issue arises in large measure from the lack of color and variety of design in the issue. Over the nearly nine years the series was on sale, all stamps were within the same hue of colors except one and all showed the heraldic flowers of Great Britain: the rose, the shamrock and the thistle (Figure 2).

All of the pence issues were within the shades of brown claret and scarlet vermilion (1857), orange (1860) and rose lake (1861), except for the 3-penny domestic letter-rate stamp that was in shades of green.

Another complexity is that stamps were printed and sent to the colony even when they

weren't particularly needed. Added to that is the question of watermarked paper used when it should not have been, and trade sample sheets issued by the printers between 1902 and 1930 bearing impressions of the Newfoundland designs.

Like Canada and the two Maritime Provinces, Newfoundland could have taken control of its post office in 1851. However, there were delays, and the Newfoundland Postal Act of 1851 was never approved by Great Britain. Further negotiations between the British government and the colonial administrators resulted in a new Postal Act in 1853 that was approved.

During 1854 and most of 1855, the postmaster general, William Solomon, wrote numerous memorandums to the governor concerning the issuance of stamps. Solomon and his father, who was postmaster of Newfoundland

before him, kept a jewelry and watch-making shop in Saint John's, from which they operated the post office (Figure 3). The new Governor, Charles Henry Darling (Figure 4), finally approved the project on Sept. 3, 1855

Once approval was received, Solomon sought out a printer for the stamps. He did not seem to know that Perkins Bacon had produced the 1851 issues of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, nor did he seem to know that the same firm was responsible for printing 15,000 £1 notes for Newfoundland in 1850.

A comedy of errors ensued when Solomon contacted different people in Great Britain and British North America whom he thought were involved in the production of stamps but were no longer or were not at all involved.

He seemed as well to have taken a long time to understand the difference between postage stamps and postal marking devices (which at the time were also called stamps). For example, he wrote a letter to the firm of D.G. Berri in London requesting stamps and the firm replied sending him information about its business: postal marking hammers.

In February 1856, Solomon finally found the right door to knock on and sent an order to a Mr. Stamford, an agent, who acknowledged it on March 27, 1856, and proceeded to negotiate with Perkins Bacon to produce the New-

Delivery was scheduled for July 1, 1856,

but it never happened. All the participants were concerned and the governor even got involved, but Perkins Bacon moved at its own pace. The dies were made between July 22 and Sept. 12 (Figure 5) while the plates were laid between Sept. 15 and Sept. 24. The plate layouts varied among the different values. An image of a pane of 20 the 8d stamp is pictured in Figure 6; these were printed in sheets of 40 divided in half.

The selection of colors was not made until Sept. 22 and the stamps were only printed on Sept. 27 and gummed on Oct. 3.

Although they were shipped to Newfoundland shortly thereafter, their saga continued. The postage stamps are believed to have arrived sometime in November. They were stuck

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
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in Halifax until Solomon negotiated that the stamps be allowed into Newfoundland free of duty.

Once that was done there was still the matter of how the stamps should be handled by the government. Though you would think such a matter would have been discussed and agreed upon earlier, Solomon was asked for his views on Dec. 2, 1856.

After counting and verification, Newfoundland's first postage stamps were put on sale Jan. 1, 1857

Solomon chose the heraldic flowers for the designs but did not give instruction on how

they were to be used. Perkins Bacon decided unilaterally to use the previously issued Nova Scotia and New Brunswick pence issues as their models (Figure 7). To differentiate the stamps they used different but similar frames.

In addition, the 3d domestic stamp was triangular (Figure 8), while the 1d and 5d, which were to be used more commonly on mail to England, were square shaped. All of the remaining values were printed as vertical rectangles.

Perkins Bacon selected only three colors to print the stamps: brown claret, green and scarlet vermilion. As far as I could find, the government of Newfoundland and Postmaster

General Solomon were not consulted when these decisions were made.

The 1857 stamps were printed on two types of paper. The first was a thick soft paper with a close square-like grill surface created by the mesh used to make this handmade paper. The second was a similar thick paper, but machinemade. It has a more yellow tinge and does not have the close mesh.

The 1860 issue and the two printings of the 1862 issue were printed on the same paper. It is a semiopaque, sometimes watermarked handmade paper.




Figure 9. The reverse of a sheet of Newfoundland's 6d issue showing a large part of the "Stacey Wise 1858" watermark. The lettering visible on this example begins just below the horizontal center of the pane, and includes the letters "CEY WISE," in one line, with "1858" below it.

The paper supplier's name, Stacey Wise, and the date, 1858, are found as a watermark once in a full sheet at different positions. As many of the finished panes were small (20 stamps in some cases); the watermark can cover more than one pane. The watermark is in serif double-line letters and numbers (Figure 9).



Two tables accompany this article. The first, titled "Newfoundland Pence issues printed and remaindered," gives an overview of the number of stamps prepared for the colony, and those actually sold. It is remarkable to note that even if certain values were not needed they were printed again and again. What was behind this waste is not known.

the 19th century. This caused many problems then and still haunts collectors of the pence issues of Newfoundland today.

Contemporary used copies of some of the issues are very rare and were rare early. This prompted many a collector and dealer to use forged cancellations on the remainders to make them more attractive to collectors.

Another area of concern for collectors is that of the trade sample sheets issued by Perkins Bacon from 1902 until 1930. Newfoundland is the only stamp-issuing entity for which Perkins Bacon recreated all the values in their sample sheets. This was done using paper and colors that can be easily confused with the originals by the inexperienced collector.

Perkins Bacon prepared trade sample What is known is that many of the values sheets containing some or all of the Newwere remaindered and were available late in foundland stamps at least 11 times between 1902 and 1929. The second table

provided here shows the list of these trade sample sheets, as documented by Robert Pratt in his book, The Pence Issues of Newfoundland, 1857-1866.

It should be noted that the reason for the making of the trade sample sheets listed as 7 and 8 are un-

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
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Forewarned is forearmed when dealing with the pence issues of Newfoundland. Knowledge of the identifying marks, the colors, the papers and the printings of these stamps is a must for the serious collector.
