of philatelic activity in Canada. As usual, the review will be divided into four segments: organized philately, philatelic literature, the trade and stamps. All dollar amounts mentioned here are in Canadian dollars, unless otherwise stated.

ORGANIZED PHILATELY

Although stamp societies are experiencing reduced memberships, they seem to be keeping their heads above water.

In 2008, Canadian stamp exhibitors participated in international exhibitions in Tel Aviv, Israel; Paris, France; Bucharest, Romania; Prague, Czech Republic; and Los Angeles, California.

Ron Brigham exhibited 20th-century material for the first time in Bucharest. His Edward VII stamp exhibit received a gold award and a special prize.

Another high-caliber exhibit on pence and cents issues appeared on the international scene. The Bytown collection, by an anonymous exhibitor, received large golds at Tel Aviv and Bucharest.

John McEntyre continues to garner gold medals for his one-frame exhibits, building on his stature as one of the most decorated one-frame exhibitors in the world. In addition to gold awards in Bucharest, Prague and Los Angeles, he was the grand-award winner in the

single-frame class at the Bucharest international stamp exhibition and at Sescal in Los Angeles.

Herb McNaught, a stalwart exhibitor at Canadian national stamp shows for many years, who participated in several world stamp exhibitions, died June 19, 2008, just shy of his 90th birthday.

PHILATELIC LITERATURE

on the subject of British North America. The list is too long to be presented here, but a list of new publications is at www.kimmerly.com, the web site of stamp dealer lan Kimmerly.

D. Robin Harris, editor of the *Unitrade Specialized Catalogue of Canadian Stamps*, continues to add more information to refine the catalog. The 2009 edition was published in October 2008 and was an instant best-seller. This edition's new features include press-sheet position pieces; Christmas seals, listed for the first time (although the listing starts in 1927 rather than with the first Christmas seals issued in 1908); an illustrated guide to extra-fine and gem stamps; and an alphabetical list of individuals other than royalty found on Canadian stamps.

In addition, new Canada Post stamps have been added; listings have been reviewed for consistency; and images have been updated with new scans, CHARLES J.G. VERGE

particularly for early Canada and early Newfoundland. The catalog is available from Unitrade Press, 99 Floral Parkway, Toronto, ON, Canada, M6L 2C4; or by phone, 416-242-5900. It is priced at \$42.95, the same as last year.

THE STAMP TRADE

Because the owner of Brigham Auctions suffered a serious illness, the firm closed permanently after eight years of operation.

The Canadian stamp world lost one of its longest-serving auctioneers when William (Bill) H. Maresch of Maresch & Son of Toronto died June 13, 2008. Although he was not actively involved with the firm during the past few years, he was a prominent force in the stamp trade and also had a major impact on the philatelic world. He was a fellow of the Royal Philatelic Society of Canada, a collector and a national judge.

STAMPS

Some of the issue dates for Canada's 2008 stamp program mentioned in the O Canada column in the February 2008 issue of *Scott Stamp Monthly* were changed, and six more stamp issues were added to the program during 2008.

A set of four Canadians in Hollywood stamps honors Canadian film and television stars Marie Dressler (née Leila Marie Koerber, 1868-1934); Ray-

mond Burr (1917-93); Norma Shearer (1902-83); and Chief Dan George (born Geswanouth Slahoot, also known as Dan Shalot, 1899-1981). The stamps were sold in souvenir sheets of four (Scott 2279, Figure 1) and in booklets of eight (Scott 2280).

The other two stamps added to the program were a 52¢ commemorative issued for the Beijing Olympics (Scott 2281, Figure 2) and a (52¢)+10¢ semipostal permanent stamp to support mental health (Scott B14, Figure 3). The original design for the Mental Health semipostal, announced by Canada Post June 18, 2008, was subsequently changed to a completely different design.

The 52¢ International Ice Hockey Championship stamp (Scott 2265) was issued with two different booklet covers and inside pane illustrations: one for Quebec City, Quebec, and the other for Halifax, Nova Scotia, the cities where the tournament was held. Two different official first-day covers were offered for sale.

The 2008 University stamps (Alberta, Scott 2263, and British Columbia, Scott 2264) were sold in gutter pairs. Tagged images of the respective university logos appear in the top selvage centered

over the stamps when viewed under ultraviolet light (Figure 4).

The Guide Dogs stamp features the denomination "52" in Braille (Scott 2266). Luke, the yellow Labrador retriever pictured on the stamp, was one of the 60 percent of seeing-eye dog trainees that failed the course.

Two joint issues were produced in 2008. The first, with France, honors the 400th anniversary of the founding of Quebec City. In addition to both countries issuing their own stamps (Canada

Scott 2269, France Scott 3437), France issued the 52¢ Canadian stamp together with the 85-cent French stamp in a souvenir sheet (Figure 5). The Canadian stamp produced by France features pink tagging on all four sides but no hidden

Château Frontenac tagging is found on the cliff on the upper right corner. The stamp is printed on Hibrite paper with white gum.

The second joint issue was with Japan, to honor the 100th anniversary of the publication of *Anne of Green Gables*, a favorite with the Japanese public (Canada Scott 2276-2278; Japan, not yet listed by Scott). The Japanese souvenir sheet

(Figure 6) contains the two joint-issue stamps and eight additional stamps.

To honor the 150th anniversary of British Columbia, Canada Post issued a 52¢ self-adhesive commemorative stamp with historic photographs on the backing paper (Scott 2283).

Many of the 2008 self-adhesive commemorative stamps were issued in booklet format, and several imperforate stamp errors have been reported for Scott 2261-2262, 2263, 2265, 2277-2278. Some of these booklets also were issued in panes of two gutter strips. As a result, collectors can make gutter pairs, and the die cuts are usually different from one pane to the other.

The stamps in Canada Post's quarterly packs and annual collections differ from the regularly issued self-adhesive stamps in that the die cuts go all the way through the backing paper.

Included in the packs are Scott 2259, 2261-2268, 2275, 2277-2278 and 2281.

On the definitive stamp front, for the convenience of its customers, Canada Post issued new nondenominated Flower permanent stamps in large coil rolls of 3,000 and 5,000 stamps (Scott 2244). The stamps were issued February 1, 2008. Differences between the large and small coil roll stamps are found in the orientation and placement of the stamps.

The Flag Over Lighthouse permanent domestic-rate booklet stamp was issued

with a revised design May 1, 2008, to correctly situate the Pachena Point, British Columbia, lighthouse (Scott 2253B, Figure 7). When the stamp was first issued in 2007, the lighthouse image was printed backward from the original image, resulting in an inaccurate representation of the location of the lighthouse. The 2008 stamp shows the lighthouse in the correct position.

The 3¢ Beneficial Insect definitive issued October 18, 2007, was discovered with the word "Canada" shifted to the right (Scott 2235a, Figure 8). This variety occurs four times on each pane of 50, in positions 11-14.

The 2010 Winter Olympics and Winter Paralympics definitive stamps announced by Canada Post July 3 were delayed from December 2008 to early 2009. The five Winter Olympics Disciplines permanent stamps will be issued January 12. The five Paralympics stamps depicting logos and mascots of the events will be issued February 12. The 2010 Winter Olympics March 2009

and Winter Paralympics will be held in Vancouver and Whistler, British Columbia, February 12-28.

The Mental Health semipostal is a nondenominated (52¢) permanent stamp with an additional 10¢ surcharge. Canada Post solicited contributions for its Foundation for Mental Health from 80,000 of its suppliers and clients. The letter sent to the individual companies was mailed in a No. 10 window postal stationery envelope inscribed "Postage Paid - Port payé" (Figure 9). The envelope was not made available to the public for mailing.

Postage paid, nondenominated postal cards were issued in 2008 for the Year of the Rat (two cards), Peonies (two cards), Art Canada (four cards), Anne of Green Gables (two cards), and Canadians in Hollywood: The Sequel (four cards). Each nondenominated postal card sells for \$1.69 and is good for mailing to anywhere in the world.

Four special envelopes were issued in 2008. These are cacheted envelopes issued for people or events deemed worthy of honor but not important enough for a stamp. The production run for each is indicated in parentheses. The envelopes sold for \$2.50 each, the same price as 2007. The envelopes honor the 100th anniversary of the Montreal Association for the Blind (April 21, 11,000 envelopes); the 100th anniversary of the Public Service Commission of Canada, the organization responsible for hiring practices and recruitment of federal bureaucrats (April 29, 13,000); the 125th anniversary of the Canadian division of the Order of St. John, also known as St. John Ambulance (June 20, 10,000); and the 100th anniversary of the use of Christmas Seals in Canada (October 1, 10,000). The four envelopes are shown in Figure 10.

On September 4, 2008, Minister of National Revenue Gordon O'Connor announced that the Canadian Bank Note Co. and SICPA Product Security SA would jointly produce a new tobacco excise stamp. The new stamp will go into use in early 2010.
