Canadian Uncut Press Sheets

ncut press sheets are a recent collecting craze fanned by the post offices of the United States and Canada. This article is an attempt to provide a full listing of available material from the Canadian Post Office.

Press sheets by definition are sheets of stamps printed in a variety of sizes depending on the press used or the format of the final product: stamp panes, souvenir sheets or booklets. Normally these press sheets are cut down to the final format before being issued to post offices. Rarely are they made available uncut to the general public.

Canada's press sheets follow this rule. Although the collecting of uncut press sheets is a recent phenomenon, we have to go back to the very beginning of Canadian philately to find the first one. In 1851, Canada's first stamp, the 3d Beaver (Scott 1, 4) was printed in sheets of 200 (Pane B at the top and Pane A at the bottom). The example illustrated in Figure 1 clearly shows that the plate proof sheets were guillotined between the B and A panes. So were

the sheets of stamps destined for post offices.

The next Canadian stamp to have been issued in full sheets was the $1/2\phi$ from the Small Queen era (Scott 34). The stamp was issued in 1882 in sheets of 200. As many as 100 gutter pairs (Figure 2) are believed to exist from sheets regularly issued to post offices during the period of use of Canada's smallest stamp (1882-1897) before it was replaced by the $1/2\phi$ from the long Jubilee series ($1/2\phi$ to \$5) issued to commemorate the 60th anniversary of Queen Victoria's accession to the throne.

In 1928, booklet panes for the 1¢ (Scott 149a), 2¢ (Scott 150a) and 5¢ (Scott 153a) were printed in sheets of 360 arranged in six vertical columns of 10 booklet panes each with each alternate column inverted (tête-bêche), Figure 3. The 1998 Unitrade Specialized Catalogue of Canadian Stamps estimates that "150 imperforate tête-bêche pairs of booklet panes existed from five complete sheets of 360 stamps. At least two of the original sheets were cut creatively into the various pairs and blocks" listed in their catalogue.

In its description, Unitrade goes on to say that "perhaps 50 sets of imperforate tête-bêche pairs of booklet panes remain intact today." These booklet sheets were not regularly issued, but made their way into philatelic hands by various means including from estate sales after senior officials of the post office who owned them died.

Many other Canadian stamps in the 1920s, 30s and 40s were printed and left imperforate and then given out as favour items. None are known in full press sheets. However, uncut press sheets of plate proofs of the 1938 pictorial issue (Scott 241-245 and C6) were offered at the American Bank Note Co. Archives Sale in September 1990. Two sheets, which have since been broken up, were in the sale. Each sheet was divided into four panes of 50 stamps. Gutter blocks and cross gutter blocks were amongst the configurations cut out of these sheets.

It was not until almost 40 years later, in 1996, that Canada Post once again made uncut press sheets commercially available. Since then seven sets of stamps have been released in uncut press sheets. Some have been sold at a premium above the face value, as they were signed by the artist and designers.

The first of this new series of uncut sheets was released in January 1996, with the introduction of an ongoing series of bird stamps. New series having been issued in 1997 and 1998 and, as these are unusually popular with the stamp buying public, they are likely to continue for the next few years. The birds portrayed on the 1996 stamps

were the American Kestrel, the Atlantic Puffin, the Pileated Woodpecker and the Ruby-throated Hummingbird (Scott 1591-1594).

The sheets of 12 stamps were issued in a diamond format. Five panes of 12 stamps were printed on the press sheets. Ten thousand special uncut sheets were printed of which 1,000 were signed. Because of this signing novelty it is likely that virtually all the signed sheets were sold. Another reason for this speculation is that Canada Post increased the number to 1,500 signed sheets for the 1997 and 1998 birds uncut press sheets but maintained the total printing of 10,000. Several distinctive differences were noted on the 1996 uncut press sheets made available to the public that indicated that these sheets were different from those used to print the regular stock. The 1996 sheets, as well as the 1997 and 1998, were sold at face value: \$27 in 1996 and \$54 in both 1997 and 1998.

The 1997 stamps featuring the Mountain bluebird, the Western grebe, the Northern gannet and the Scarlet tanager (Scott 1631-1634) and the 1998 stamps featuring the Hairy woodpecker, Great crested flycatcher, the Eastern screech-owl, the Gray-crowned rosy-finch and the (Scott 1710-1713) returned to a more regular format. They were issued in rectangular sheets of 20 stamps.




Figure 4: Number 1,500 of 1,500 signed uncut press sheet for the 1998 birds set.

The uncut press sheets were made up of six panes of 20 (Figure 4). This configuration allowed for the more standard gutter pairs and blocks and cross gutter blocks (Figure 5). The signed uncut press sheets were sold for \$69 in 1996, a full \$42 over face value and for \$89.95 in 1997 and 1998, a markup of \$35.95 over

the face value.

On the occasion of CAPEX 96, the World Philatelic Exhibition held in Toronto that year, Canada Post issued the second 1996 uncut press sheet. It contained three souvenir sheets (or souvenir panes as Canada Post calls them) of the Historic Vehicles series

issued yearly from 1993 to 1996. The 24 vehicles stamps were reissued in lower denominations (5¢, 10¢ and 15¢) with an additional 25th stamp at domestic rate (45¢) that showed the Bricklin, a short-lived Canadian-made car, which had not previously been issued separately.




Figure 6: A section from the Historic Vehicles uncut press sheet showing the sequential sheet number.

The change to the smaller denominations allowed Canada Post to provide a souvenir product at the show at a very low price. The face value of the souvenir sheet was \$3.75. The uncut press sheet, which came wrapped in tissue paper and in a triangular box to prevent damage, was sold at \$20, \$8.75 over face. Although 25,000 were issued, it is unlikely that all the Vehicle uncut press sheets were sold. From time to time you still find them for sale in retail post offices in Canada. Uncut press sheets include, as a rule, all the printing information that is later trimmed off before sale. These include marginal guidelines, color blocks indicating which colors were used and how to register them, cutting marks, etc. The Vehicles sheets also have a sequential identification number from 1 to 25,000 indicating the order in which they were printed (Figure 6).

As an aside, Canada Post will not divulge the number of sheets that they sell for each issue. It is therefore unlikely that they have had any sellouts for these sheets except for the annual Lunar New Year uncut press sheets that they admit publicly to have been a sellout. The demand for these far outweighed availability.

The daily stampede to the Canada Post booth at PACIFIC 97 to buy, on a first-come, first-served basis, 50 uncut press sheets of the Year of the Ox (Scott 1630)




Figure 7: The sold-out uncut press sheet for The Year of the Tiger issued January 8.

was such a threat to security that the show organizers requested Canada Post find another way to sell them. They instituted a lottery on the third day of the show and the 50 winners had to be present at the draw and then pay \$20 for the sheet. The rush to the Canada Post booth to enter the lottery continued unabated every morning. It was quite a sight, particularly since the crowd was being gently controlled by two Royal Canadian Mounted Police officers in their striking scarlet uniforms.


The Lunar New Year uncut press sheets contain 12 souvenir sheets of two stamps each. Their face value is \$10.80. Fifteen thousand of the 1997 Year of the Ox uncut press sheets were offered at \$20 and with their quick sellout, 30,000 were ordered for the 1998 Year of the Tiger (Scott 1708,

Figure 7). These also sold out very quickly at \$24.95. None of these sheets were signed by the artist or the designer. As there are more Lunar New Years to celebrate, I guess collectors of uncut press sheets can look forward to another 10 between 1999 and 2008.

The latest in the series of uncut press sheets was issued on June 29, for the 125th anniversary of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP), Figure 8. The two 45¢ stamps joined by a gutter (or tab depending on your definition) provide a continuous design going from the picture of an original male "Mountie" in 1873 to a 1998 female "Mountie" and showing, in the middle, the famous RCMP Musical Ride. The vibrant colors of the stamps and their original continuous design make for a very pleasing uncut press sheet.
